TUITION FEES.

1. *College Proper*: From \$4.50 to \$6.50 per term, according to Boy's Form, books and stationery provided free of charge.

2. *Preparatory School*: From \$2.00 to \$3.00 per term, books and stationery provided by parents.

Each boy is required to provide himself with a B.F.C. Mark Book (10 cents) which becomes his own property.

NOTE 1.—An Entrance Fee of \$10 is charged at the beginning of a boy's first term.

NOTE 2.—Boarders may remain in residence during the Christmas holidays on payment of \$8.00.

Typewriting -Complete course of lessons \$7.00; Practice on College Typewriters, \$1.00 a term; Manual Training, 25 cents a term; Practical and Conversational French, \$2.50 a term; Use of Science Laboratory including apparatus and material, \$2.50 a term; Piano, fees according to Teacher's charges; Practice on the College Pianos, \$1.00 a term; Home lessons under supervision with the Boarders, \$2.00 a term.

ADMISSION.

Boys are admitted to the Preparatory Department when they have completed their fifth year, or earlier if thought physically fit by the Headmaster.

COLLEGE TERMS.

There are four terms in the School year—Michaelmas Term, Christmas Term, Lent Term and Trinity Term. These end respectively in November, February, April and July and contain roughly 10 working weeks each.

PAYMENT OF FEES.

Fees are due in advance.

NOTICE OF REMOVAL.

When a boy is leaving the College, either one month's notice or half a term's fees will be required.

TO ALL FRIENDS OF BP. FEILD COLLEGE.

MY DEAR FRIENDS, — Your representatives have appointed me to a position that I am very proud and pleased to hold, and I like to think that as I am glad to be back so you are glad to have me back. The Headmaster of the College, however, has to bear a very heavy load of responsibility. He is expected to perform the duties of a teacher, a hotel-keeper, an accountant, a father, and in a minor degree of a doctor, a clergyman, a judge, an executioner, a plumber, an electrician, an editor, a provider of public entertainments and a general organiser. It is very unlikely that I shall be able to play such a variety of parts with complete success, especially at first; and while I shall do my utmost to avoid mistakes, I count upon your sympathy and support, not only when everything is going well with us, but also during the dark days which an institution such as this is liable to experience.

If you will remember that the school is *yours*—not the Directors' and not mine—and if you will do what you can to help me to increase its efficiency, it will not fail to bring credit to all those connected with it; but if you are indifferent as to whether we sink or swim, if you are content to stand aloof and merely look on as we struggle to put ourselves in a satisfactory financial position, you will be no friends to your own interests or to the interests of your own children.

I hope to be able, before long, to find something for every Friend of the College to do to help us out of our difficulties. If any of you will help us, first with suggestions and then by offering to carry out the suggestions made, you will be friends worth having. We need an organised body to arrange for bazaars, teas, dramatic entertainments, lectures, working-parties, concerts, garden parties and other means for raising the money to clear away the debt on the buildings and to supply some of the many needs of the College. A society should be formed with committees to look after the various branches of work. As soon as possible I shall ask the friends of the College to come together to form such a society.

Those of you who feel any good-will towards your own school or towards anyone actively connected with it—and which

of you is without a brother, or husband, or son, or father, who has been educated at the College—will thus be given an opportunity of putting your good-will into deeds.

The other denominations are working hard for their schools. I call upon all of you to show that you, too, are capable of making some sacrifice for your College.

Some of you may ask "Why is the College not self-supporting as it ought to be?" If we were, we should be far below the level of the other Colleges in St. John's, not one of which is any more self-supporting than we are. The fees in all the Colleges are too low. The other denominations actually do more to supplement the incomes of their Colleges than we do; for they charge lower fees, and, if they give as good an education, their expenses must be as heavy as ours. But for the help given by their friends they would have a greater annual deficit than we have. I ask you, every one of you, to help me to make your school the best institution of its kind in the Island, to take an *active* interest in the condition of the College and to show that you bear the school at least as much good-will as other denominations display towards their educational institutions.

Mr. C. Hunt has kindly consented to continue to be responsible for collecting any Old Feildian material. We hope to make every department of *The Feildian* as interesting to our readers as possible.



“THE FEILDIAN” will be issued four times each year. The present number is late because it was necessary for us to know what the contents were of the last number before this issue, and because the printers have been busy with their Christ-

mas numbers and with election literature. Moreover the Editor has had so many new duties to learn that his editorial education has had to be deferred. We offer our apologies for the lateness of this issue, and we promise to aim at more punctuality in future numbers.



THE FEILDIAN FOR 1907-8.—So interesting and complete was the number for the past school year that the first issue for 1908-9 may seem comparatively insignificant. We congratulate Mr. Blackall upon the very fine production which has so fitly crowned his work as Editor of THE FEILDIAN.



THE LATE HEADMASTER.—It is almost impossible to over-estimate the great loss which the College has sustained by the resignation of Mr. Blackall. His unceasing energy, his great administrative and organising ability, his tremendous capacity for work, his never-failing optimism have been devoted for so long to the service of the school that we have perhaps learned to take them too much as a matter of course. We shall realise the value of Mr. Blackall's work more fully if we compare the College of 1908 with the Church of England Academy of 1891. We may well be satisfied if anything like the same rate of progress is maintained. We heartily congratulate Mr. Blackall upon his well-earned promotion, and we are confident that his work as Superintendent of Education will be crowned with the same success as were his labours of the past seventeen years. We trust that we shall continue to enjoy the benefit of his long experience in connection with the work of the College, and we look to him for advice and sympathy in all our difficulties and successes during the years to come.



THE NEW HEADMASTER—On Sept. 14 the new Headmaster was introduced to the College by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland. His Lordship referred to the late Headmaster's long and successful service and to his enthusiastic devotion to the welfare of the College. A hearty welcome was offered to Mr. Wood on his return to his old school. Mr. Blackall regretted that the time had come when he must sever his connection with the College as its Headmaster, and expressed his pleasure in seeing the vacant position filled by one of his Old Boys. Mr. Wood thanked the previous speakers for their hearty

welcome. He acknowledged with the utmost gratitude the great debt that he owed his former Headmaster, and he hoped that the College, with which he had been connected as boy and Master for thirteen years, would continue to make as great progress as it had done in the past. He asked that a holiday might be given to celebrate the first appointment of an Old Feildian to the position of Headmaster of the College.



THE NEW ASSISTANT MASTER—On the same occasion the new Assistant Master, Mr. A. McBain, was welcomed by His Lordship. Mr. McBain is a Master of Arts of Aberdeen University and was educated at the Grammar School of Aberdeen. The work that Mr. McBain has already done as a Master in the College convinces us that we have been so fortunate as to secure a most efficient and hard-working Assistant. We welcome him as one of our Staff and trust that he may spend many pleasant and profitable years with us.



THE STAFF—With the exception of Mr. McBain the present staff consists throughout of former pupils of Bishop Feild College, and, in the Preparatory Department, of Bishop Spencer College. One might go far before finding a group of teachers so filled with enthusiasm for their work and for the College. Nothing that is for the good of the school is too much trouble for them to do. The Headmaster thanks them for their loyal support and self-sacrifice during the past three months. The College may well feel proud of the fact that it is so entirely a *native* institution consisting of Newfoundland boys managed by a Newfoundland staff.



BISHOP FEILD COLLEGE COMPARED WITH SCHOOLS IN ENGLAND—It is said that "comparisons are odious," but in this case they will be odious only to those who are not amongst our readers. After some eight years' experience of English schools we are proud to be able to say that the average English school of the same size as the College is in no way superior to our own institution. Our income is smaller, but the work we do is as advanced and as thorough as that of most English schools. We do not specialise to the same extent, but we give our boys a better general education. With us, games are a means rather than an end,—a means of which in many cases, un-

fortunately, our boys do not avail themselves. The discipline and general order of the College are well up to the average. Some of our older boys are perhaps too little sensible of the influence which they possess, and not sufficiently careful of their own dignity; but this is a fault which a hint, such as this, should cure. The equipment of the College is not on the whole as good as that of the ordinary English school; but the earnestness and efficiency of the staff does much to make up for this defect. Speaking generally we may conclude that Newfoundland is fortunate in possessing colleges which give its boys as good an education as can be obtained in the ordinary English school, and which in many ways do more to prepare them for work in the world.



THE SCHOOL GAMES—There is one particular in which the College is decidedly less well equipped than it should be. The playing space is decidedly inadequate. Llewellyn Place is a good field, but it only provides room for one game. This means that out of 200 boys, only about 22 are given an opportunity for joining in the school games. It is true that we can use the Bishop's field on King's Bridge Road, but it is on a steep slope, and it is unsatisfactory to have separate fields. The College needs room for at least three games at once if we are to compete successfully with the other Colleges. The football season in the schools is so short and the Inter-Collegiate matches begin so early that the field must be monopolised by the first team, and outside the best twenty-two there can be little or no systematic practice. This means that each season the younger boys get little or no football, and so no new material is being prepared for the following season when the older boys will have left. More extensive playing space is the most urgent need of the College at the present time. Exercise in the open air is an absolute necessity for boys whose parents wish them to grow up to be strong and healthy. Moreover it very seldom happens that a weakling physically is anything but a weakling mentally. The Island is only just awakening to the fact that fresh air is one of the necessities of life if one wishes to avoid consumption and kindred ills. We trust that all interested in the College will join with us in our endeavour to encourage boys to take part in the School Games. The first step in this direction will be to obtain a large field for the school—a field capable of holding several games of football at the same time. St. Bonaventure's College has three or four teams practising at once. 's it to be wondered at that they have carried all before them of late years? If we are to turn out winning teams we must give our boys

something like an equal chance to learn the games while they are young.



THE GAMES FUND—Hitherto only about fifty boys have subscribed to the School Games Fund and of these some thirty were boarders. This has meant that the Fund has been too small to provide the necessary material. At the instigation of the Headmaster the Directors have decided to make it compulsory, after the present school year which ends in July, 1909, for every boy to pay a small subscription not to exceed 25 cents per term, and graduated according to age or Form. Every boy will then be given an opportunity to join in the School Games, and it is hoped that in every Form, even in the Preparatory School, it will be possible to arouse interest in and love for organised games such as football and cricket. There will be little difficulty in getting the boys to play if they are given the opportunity and if their parents encourage them to go to the school field instead of playing on the streets. Care will be taken to arrange for boys to play with others of their own size and strength, and in this way boys will learn to hold their own amongst their fellows, and to be neither bullies nor cowards.



THE COLLEGE COMPANY—The trouble between the C.L.B. and the College Company has been settled to the satisfaction of both sides. It would do no good to go into particulars here as to the causes of the dispute which was largely due to misunderstanding. We have agreed to speak of the College Corps as the College Company (C. Company) of the C.L.B., and to do our utmost, as is only just, to further the work and aims of the Brigade. It is understood by both sides that the College Company is not to be called upon to engage in Brigade work during school hours, i.e., between 9 and 4 in the day and between 7 and 9.30 in the evening. The pressure is so great in schools now-a-days that it would be fatal for us to undertake to devote more of our school time to Brigade work than the 1 hour per week that we already give to drill. It is most gratifying to note that the Company is in a most flourishing condition as regards both numbers and enthusiasm. The report of the annual outing at Donovan's, on the King's Birthday, will be found in the Boys' Quarter of the FEILDIAN. Our thanks are due to the Hon. E. R. Bowring for so generously providing the tea, and to the Reid-Nfld. Co. for allowing us a special rate for the journey back to town.

CHANGES—Very few changes have been made in connection with the working of the College, and it is unlikely that it will be necessary to make any important alterations. Two half-holidays per week—on Wednesday and Saturday afternoon have taken the place of the whole holiday on Saturday. There has been very little opposition to this, and while we gain two hours by working on Saturday morning instead of on Wednesday afternoon, the boys cannot fail to be benefited by the rest and exercise which they now obtain in the middle of the week. Moreover we now have two chances per week of a fine holiday as against one under the former system. Now that it is almost dark by 4 o'clock there is little inducement for the ordinary boy to get exercise in the open air after school hours.

We have also introduced what we call a *Merit* half holiday. This we give about twice a term to those boys who have earned it by steady hard work and satisfactory conduct. Each boy's work is discussed at a full meeting of the Staff, and the attention of all is thus drawn, both to those who are doing well and to those who are idle and indifferent. Boys who are detained cannot expect to spend anything but an unpleasant afternoon, while the others have the satisfaction of feeling that their efforts have been seen and rewarded.



TYPE WRITING—As this is an important subject for boys intending to go into business, the charge for a course of lessons has been reduced from \$4.00 to \$2.00. A further charge of \$1.00 per term will continue to be made for practice on the College typewriting machines. This is necessary for repairs, etc. Parents who wish their sons to be prepared for office work are urged to take advantage of this reduction in charges.



WRITING—An effort is being made to improve the writing and neatness of the College. Parents who wish their boys to write well are asked to see that the Home Work is done carefully. Every boy who chooses to take the trouble can learn to write well. A master who has thirty books to mark in a lesson cannot always give the time to make sure that every boy has written his work as well as he can. A parent who has only *one* book to look at can easily insist upon having untidy or careless work re-written. Already there has been general improvement since the beginning of the school year. Parents can do much to make this improvement more marked.

THE HOSTEL.—So full is the Hostel that it will very soon be impossible to take in any more. With room still for two small boys we have two whose parents wish them to enter after Christmas. It is evident that we shall need very shortly to make arrangements for further expansion. At present there are thirty-two boarders in residence. There may be a vacancy or two after Christmas which will of course be filled by the earliest applicants.

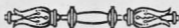

THE STEEPLECHASE, 1908.

THIS branch of the school's athletics is of early date, being started but last year. As is well known, the College is divided into two sections for the purpose of promoting competitions within the school. One section is composed of those lads who live outside the city and board at the College, known familiarly as Boarders, athleticly as "Perioikoi"; the other, of those boys who have their homes in the city, and known in athletic circles in the College as "Oppidani." This competition takes place during the lull between the football and hockey seasons,—generally about the last week in November. Last year there was but one competition, open to the whole school, this year there were two competitions, the Junior and the Senior. The Junior was for boys of 14 years and under, the Senior for boys over that age. Both races took place on the same afternoon, Saturday, Nov. 28th. For the two weeks previous to the race, the boys of each division had been training hard, and "licking themselves into shape;" and speculation was rife as to the outcome of the contest, each side having its own particular favourite. The Junior competition was arranged to start at 2.45 p.m. on the afternoon stated above, and promptly at that time fifteen stalwart youths took their departure from the playground, the Headmaster, Mr. Wood, giving them the signal "go." They hied them countrywards and 42½ minutes later the noble form of F. Jerret was seen approaching in the distance, closely followed by R. Steele; which order was maintained until the winning-post was reached. Jerret is to be congratulated on his fine run, as also is Steele; both put up a plucky fight. The following was the order in which the runners completed the course: 1—Jerret; 2—Steele; 3—Parsons; 4—Furieux; 5—Goldstone; 6—Ellis E.; 7—Pilot, W.; 8—Trebble; 9—Newman; 10—Jackman, R.

The Senior race started at 3 p.m., after having survived the ordeal of being photographed by Mr. Weston Stirling. All ran well together until Long Pond Bridge was reached, and then the pace began to tell on some who began gradually to drop behind. Robins, Norris, Tait, and White now began to break away from the rest, and this order was kept until the first post was reached. After that, Robins simply left the others behind altogether. When the woods were reached, Robins was well ahead, followed by Tait, Norris, and White in that order, with the others some distance behind. While going through the woods, Norris overtook Tait and got up to second place again. This order was maintained until the winning-post was reached; Robins com-

pleting the course in $46\frac{1}{2}$ minutes, and thereby beating last year's record of $52\frac{1}{2}$ minutes by six minutes. Norris' time for the whole course was 48 minutes, 30 seconds. Tait's, 48 minutes and 35 seconds; White's, 51 minutes and 30 seconds; and C. Martin's 53 minutes and 30 seconds. Altogether there were 10 entries, the order at the finish being: 1—Robins; 2—Norris; 3—Tait; 4—White A.; 5—Martin, C.; 6—Gover; 7—Martin, A.; 8—Shaw; 9—Gardner; 10—Bishop, G.

The *Perioikoi* were victors in both the Senior and Junior competition, obtaining 12 points in the former, as against 9 for the *Oppidani*, and 11 points to 10 in the latter. Points were awarded in accordance with last year's scheme: 1st place—7 points; 2nd—5 points; 3rd—4 points; 4th—3 points; 5th—2 points.

On behalf of the boys, the writer wishes to thank very much Mr. Wood, Mr. Bernard and Mr. Jeffery for taking such interest in these competitions. The success of the race was due, in no small measure, to their efforts. We are also very grateful to Mr. S. O. Steele, who so generously provided a prize for the winner in each division.
