About two miles between Ottawa city an extraordinary reception was proffered to the Prince of Wales. 12000 men in 150 birch canoes had gone down the river. Their fleet, in the form of a letter V., point foremost. A few Indian canoes, with warriors in full dress, led the van—the rest belonged to, and were manned by, lumberers; some in red shirts and white trousers—some in blue, with silver braid all in uniform of some kind, but the beauty of the sight consisted not so much in the singularity of the dress as in the fine appearance of the men themselves. They are good representatives of the 12 or 15,000 hardy, sturdy men who can camp out all winter with but one blanket for a covering. They had opened out on two lines, one on each side of the river, as the Prince came along, and as he passed they raised a more vigorous cheer than he had yet heard in America, waived their flags and flourished their paddles. The Prince and suite were much interested, and even excited, hastily going up to the hurricane deck to see.

The Phoenix slowed for a short time as she went by, when the canoes all closed in and reformed the V. The steamer being by this time at the point of it, and leading behind as if in the hollow of the letter, were six other river steam-boats crowded with passengers.

The whole liabilities of the Montreal Citizens' Reception Committee amount to nearly \$43,000, while their receipts are about \$33,000. Against a deficit of some \$10,000, however, they have to place the ball room structure; and a Canadian paper suggests a monster Promenade Concert to aid the Committee, and prevent a further appeal for subscription.

The London Times of a recent date has the following paragraph:—"Our readers will remember the case of Mrs. Putnam, a lady of color, whose treatment on board the Europa, mail packet, on her passage to England from America, in November, 1859, was the subject of a correspondence with Sir Samuel Cunard, which appeared in our columns. In a letter received within the last few days, Mrs. Putnam writes that she and her party, during the whole passage to the United States on her return voyage by the Arabia, were admitted to all the rights and privileges of first class passengers, without opposition on the part of any one, even though shareholders were on board, or any failure in that courteous treatment which was their due. She speaks also of the polite and kind attention of some of her fellow passengers.

GREAT BRITAIN AND NICARAGUA.—The British government has recently formed a treaty with Nicaragua, by which, according to a synopsis in the New York Times, the latter grants to British subjects and property the right of transit between the Atlantic and the Pacific, through the territories of the republic, by any route which may now or hereafter exist, reserving, however, its full right of sovereignty over the same. Great Britain extends her protection to all such routes, and guarantees their neutrality. Nicaragua engages to maintain peace and order on the route, and upon failure to do so, Great Britain may, with the consent of the republic, employ her own forces for that purpose. But in case of unforeseen or imminent danger to British subjects or property, the British forces are authorised to act without waiting for such consent. These stipulations, it will be seen, give to Great Britain the right of practical intervention in the affairs of Nicaragua if any emergency should render it necessary, and may seriously interfere with the plans of Gen. William Walker.

THE EMPEROR NAPOLEON IN ALGERIA.—It is stated in a letter from Algiers that extraordinary preparations continue to be made for the reception of the Emperor. Not only is the city getting up fetes of an Oriental character, but the whole colony from Tunis to the frontier of Morocco is in movement; all the chiefs of tribes at the head of their most skilful horsemen being already on the march for the encampment in the plain of the Mitidja. It is now calculated that at least 60,000 Arabs will assemble there, and almost incredible accounts are given of the splendour of the costumes and the horse trappings which they will display, each tribe being anxious to outstrip the others in magnificence.

A SPANISH RETREAT FOR THE KING OF NAPLES.—The Madrid papers are beginning to discuss what is to be the future personal situation of the King of Naples, and it is curious enough that the legitimist journals, which have hitherto denied the possibility of his dethronement, seem to be disposed to deny him that hospitality which the organs of the liberal party would have no objection to grant him. The Spanish government, however, appears to have settled this question affirmatively; at least, we are informed by a Madrid telegram that Queen Isabella has placed the palace at Seville at the disposal of her royal cousin. Should Francis II. avail himself of this kind offer, it will be an edifying spectacle to see the son of that monarch who, whilst he still received at his court the representatives of the elder Bourbons, refused for a long while to recognise his niece Isabella II., and who quarrelled with his own sister, Queen Christina, for her share in the dynastic revolution, now accepting a refuge in Spain.

CAPE ST. MARY'S LIGHT.

NOTICE TO MARINERS

THE BOARD OF WORKS hereby give notice
the Light House on Cape St. Mary's will be
put in requisition on the 20th September next,
and that the Light be exhibited every night from
sunset until sunrise.

The Light will be revolving catadioptric of the
first order producing alternately every minute a
brilliant-red and whitelight, burning at an eleva-
tion of 325 feet above the level of the sea, and

last, the Governor of Newfoundland pub-
lished a notice that Tenders would be received
at the Office of the Colonial Secretary until Thurs-
day, the 20th day of September next, for the em-
ployment of two first-class Steamers for the per-
formance of the services therein specified; and
whereas, the said Government deem further
information to the public necessary: Notice is
hereby given:

1. That the Steamer to run fortnightly along
the North-east coast of this Island, between St.
John's and Twillingate, shall call at the follow-
ing intermediate Ports: Trinity, Bonavista, or
Catalina, Greenspond, and Fogo; the other of
such Steamers "to run fortnightly and along the
Southern and Western coast of the Island," at
Ferryland, Great Placentia, Burin, Harbor Briton,
Burgeo Island and La Poile.
2. The Steamer plying on the North-east Coast
of the Island will make one trip, about the latter
end of July, to any one port on the Coast of La-
brador, as the Government may determine.
3. The Contractors only bound to provide
Judges and suite on Circuit with a passage; and
should this service conflict with the defined route
of the Steamers, the Circuit route to be carried
out as indicated by Proclamation.
4. Freight and Passage money to be subject
to the approval of the Government.
5. In the event of the loss of either or both
Steamers, if in the Winter season, the Contractor
or Contractors may substitute a sailing vessel for
the period of six months from time of the loss;
and if in the Summer season, for the period of
three months.
6. The conditions contained in the fourth and
fifth paragraphs applicable to the Steamer to
run between North and South sides of Concep-
tion Bay.
7. The number of ports, besides that contain-
ed in the former notice, at which the Steamer to
ply between the North and South sides of Con-
ception Bay is to call, will be Harbor Grace,
Carbonear, Brigus, Bay Roberts, and Portugal
Cove.
8. The Steamers plying North and South may
lie up during the months of January, February
and March, in each year. 1-1
