The Revolution in Sicily.

GARIBALDI'S MOVEMENTS AND PLANS.

The Turin correspondent of the Daily News writing on the 17th inst., says:—A few hundred Garibaldians have, it is true, landed in Calabria at several points, and many Calabrians have also landed, who had previously gone over to Sicily to procure arms and learn how to organize themselves. Many points of the coast are being threatened, and the Bourbon's means of defence studied; but a great part of Garibaldi's ships are collected in the waters of Cogliari, the smaller vessels, which are numerous, being near Messina. In the meantime Garibaldi came yesterday quite unexpectedly to the Island of La Madeirna [about ten miles west of the north coast of Sardinia], where he took in 150 tons of coal for the use of his steamers. With less certainty I inform you that he may have been at Genoa last night, or he may arrive there this morning; and, in short, it is possible he may have arrived here at Turin to confer with an exalted personage.

The Paris correspondent of the Daily News, writing on the 21st, says:—

Important news of Garibaldi may now be expected every hour. (It is not to be wondered at that the closest secrecy as to the great movements in preparation should have been kept for some days past. It is now known that General Cozens left Messina on the night of the 17th, with a dozen officers only, in order to head the insurrection in Calabria. The equivocal position which circumstances force Count Cavour's government to assume, give rise to much speculation. According to the latest news the two Sardinian ships, Costituzione and Tenaro, sent on a suspicious mission with sealed orders, were cruising off the Isle of Sardinia, having two battalions of bersaglieri on board. According to one rumour they are directed to prevent any attack against the Roman States, but another story is that they are to cut off any fresh reinforcements of volunteers that may attempt to make their way to Garibaldi.

A letter from Turin, dated the 16th instant, and published in the Journal des Debats, says:—M. Bertani has come back from Sicily. He is now in the island of Sardinia, where he has established the head-quarters of his operations, because there he can maintain greater secrecy. There is some rumour of an expedition against the Roman States—the scheme, in fact, was never abandoned—only adjourned. The possession of Rome, indeed, is the principal object of the union party. Nicotera is still in Tuscany. A letter from Florence states that a corps of volunteers for invading the Papal territory has been collected at Castellpucci, in Tuscany, and is there being organised. I can assure that Austria advises the King of Naples not to think of a coup d'etat to return to the ancient regime but to defend himself energetically. I have reason to believe that General de Lamoriciere and his troops will combine their movements with those of the army of Naples.

THE CHINA EXPEDITION.—All the accounts we receive from China concur in representing everything as going on as well as possible as regards the British expedition. The whole of the troops had arrived with the exception of the siege train, and there was at hand a small siege train, sufficient to commence with until its arrival. The army was in wonderfully good health, excellent spirits, and from the generals downwards, full of mutual confidence. The expedition was about to start for the north, but at the date of our advices there appeared to be considerable doubt as to the French being ready in time. Indeed, the accounts we hear on excellent authority of the state of our allies are not calculated to sustain their boasted superiority in organization. They had no horses for their guns, next to no commissariat, and very few carriage animals for stores, &c. We understand that an offer was made by Sir Hope Grant of a number of ponies was at first accepted by General Montauban, but afterwards rejected on the score of their expense, which was no more than that at which they had been supplied to the British army. Let us hope it will not end in our allies expecting us to supply those deficiencies which it is their pride to say they experience generally to a much less extent than ourselves.

Many a true heart that would have come back like a dove to the ark, after his first transgression, has been frightened beyond recall by the angry look or menace—the taunt, the savage charity of an unforgiving spirit.

GARIBALDI TO THE WOMEN OF SICILY.—According to a letter in the Press, the want of self-reliance and preserving energy of the men of Sicily has occasioned Garibaldi some disappointment, and has led him to appeal to the women in the following proclamation:

TO THE SICILIAN WOMEN.

Liberty, the most precious gift of Providence to peoples, has been gained for Sicily, thanks to the manly resolution of the Sicilians, and the generous aid of their brethren of the continent. Liberty, difficult to gain, is more difficult to keep, as all Italy for ages has experienced to her cost. Sicily is such a country that there is no need in her case to recur to foreign histories to find examples of all kinds of civic virtues, and the women there have at all times displayed a courage which has astonished the world. From the women of Syracuse, who cut off their tresses to make ropes of them in the old Roman days, to those of Messina, who encouraged their relatives to attack a bombarding host, there are valiant deeds of this sex in this island. The Vespers, also, an event unparalleled in the history of nations, saw fair islanders fighting by the side of the combatants for national independence.

I myself (I recall the occasion with emotion), in denouncing from the Palace of Palermo to this generous people the humiliating pretensions of their tyrant heard a groaning repeated by the women who crowded the balconies, deep enough to turn an army pale, and that groaning was the death-sentence of tyranny.

Sicily is free, it is true; a single citadel only remains in the power of the enemy; but eleven years ago, Sicilian valour achieved the same result; and yet that free land through not having chosen to make a last effort, fell back into slavery, was trodden once more under mercenary feet, and brought to a worse condition than before the glorious revolution. Dear and gracious women of Sicily hear the voice of the man who sincerely loves your beautiful country to which he is bound by the affection of his whole life. He asks of you nothing for himself nothing for others; but for the common fatherland he asks your powerful assistance. Call to arms the inhabitants of this island, and shame those who cling to their mother's or sweetheart's apron-strings.

THE RELIGIOUS PROFESSIONS AND THE PRACTICE OF THE DRUSES.—If the Druses lived up to the seven commandments in which they express their moral laws, they would not be so dreaded and so cruel a people, for murder, theft, covetousness and cruelty are prohibited as special crimes, and chastity, honesty, meekness and mercy are regarded as high virtues—so high, unfortunately, that the present Druse generation cannot reach them. The men have but one wife each, the form of government is patriarchal, different tribes having a Sheik, and the agriculture is carefully attended to. No marriages are contracted outside of the sect, and the Druses adhere tenaciously to their religious traditions. All the male population is trained from youth to serve in war, and the Druses have more than once revolted against the Turkish government, which holds nominal sway over them. Yet, of late years, they have been regarded as a peaceful and quiet people, and were disabusing their neighbours of the traditional opinions as to their ferocity and cruelty, until the great Christian massacre of this summer proves that their unenviable notoriety was not without a just foundation.

With so many features in their own approximating to the Christian religion, it appears somewhat strange that the Druses should manifest such fiendish barbarity as they have recently done. But to them, strong monotheists as they are, the doctrines of polytheism are peculiarly repulsive. In the ceremonies of the Greek and Roman churches they perceive what they think to be a worship of more than one God; they do not comprehend the revelations of the three persons in the Trinity, and especially fail to understand the interpretation of the material symbols held in such veneration in those churches.

The protestants of Syria, whose religion does not present these features, would probably share better if the Druses understood more about them; but the Protestants, as well as the Greek and Catholics, all come under the general head of Christians, and as such fall beneath the indiscriminating fury of these fanatics.

Never laugh at that which cannot be helped. To laugh at a lame man, age insanity, or a fool, or any other misfortune is a certain mark of a small, weak and very, very shallow mind.

It is true greatness that constitutes glory, and virtue is the cause of both; and an unworthy behaviour degrades and disennobles a man more than birth and fortune aggrandize and exalt him.
